### ALICE ANDERSON

Alice was the first female mechanic in Australia. Can you find the replica of her workshop in the museum? Alice often worked till late at night and slept in her office and even kept a pet there, a big tabby cat.



### MERRYWEATHER FIRE ENGINE

The 1909 Merryweather fire engine was the first motorised fire appliance in South Australia – before this, fire trucks were pulled by horses!



### HARRY POTTER

Can you find the 1962 Ford Anglia? It's the same model as the Weasleys' Flying Car from the Harry Potter series. The original is thought to still be hiding somewhere around Hogwarts.



### FIT FOR A PRINCESS

This majestic Rolls Royce was used to drive the Royals, like Princess Diana, when they visited Australia.



### A STUNTMAN'S BIKE

This Triumph motorbike is just like the one used by the most famous stunt rider ever, Evel Knievel, to jump over the fountain in front of Caesar's Palace in Las Vegas.



### THE COUNT AND HIS PUSHBIKE

Once upon a time, De Dion was a very famous car brand. Its owner, the Count De Dion (a fancy French aristocrat!) had another passion: he started the Tour de France, the world's most famous bike race!



### RACECAR OR TRACTOR?

The Chamberlain 8 is a cool little race car which was built by two clever brothers, Bob and Bill Chamberlain. They were good at building fast cars, but even better at building tractors. Chamberlain became one of the top tractor brands in Australia.



### 1971 CHRYSLER VALIANT CHARGER

This Valiant Charger was used by Leo Geoghegan to race at Bathurst in 1971. Bathurst became such a legendary race in Australia that people just called it 'The Race'.



### MORE THAN A UTE

Almost 90 years ago Ford designed a car to be pretty enough to drive to church on Sunday, but with a tray big enough to carry pigs to market on Monday. It became known as the ute, and we still use them today.



### AUSTRALIN SURF CULTURE

This Austin A30 is from a time when young people in Australia first started to live the surfie life, driving from beach to beach to catch waves. Gnarly!
